Curriculum focus of PPG spending 2012/13

The school has focused its additional support in purchasing ICT software- Purple Mash that both supports and enhances key skills in reading, writing and mathematics.

School has invested in Talk for Writing, which aims to improve writing across both Key Stages and in the Foundation Stage.

We track all pupils' progress every half term, so that we can quickly see if the plans put into place for a child are working. We will report your child's progress to you at parent's evening, and in the end of year report to parents, but if you would like any information on your child's progress at any time, please speak in the first instance to their class teacher.

The amount of pupils receiving PPG in each cohort is very small.

In May 2013, 68.8% of Year 1 pupils achieved a pass in the Year 1 Phonics check, including all pupils receiving PPG.

There were 14 pupils at the end of Key Stage 2. Of these, 2 (14.3%) were eligible for free school meals

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achieved a level 4+ in Reading , Writing and Maths compared to 91.7% of pupils who were not eligible

for FSM.

14.3% (2) of the pupils in the cohort were eligible for free school meals or were children who were looked

after (FSM & CLA). Of these 100% (2 pupils) achieved a level 4+ in Reading , Writing and Maths

compared to 91.7% of pupils who are not eligible for FSM & CLA. The FSM & CLA gap for Brinsley

Primary School is 8.3%. This is lower than Nottinghamshire's FSM & CLA gap.

Service Children- We have currently two service children in school. Both children have achieved a good level of development. Our service children are not under achieving compared to their peers, but the premium is provided in recognition of the support that may be needed by pastoral issues.

Internal assessment data identified that across all Key Stages, Pupils receiving PPG as a group made at least good progress or better in English and Mathematics and made similar progress to pupils who were not receiving PPG.
